PHAEDRA BY AVRA SIDIROPOULOU

Phaedra I—, written and directed by Avra Sidiropoulou, is Athens-based Persona Theatre Company's new international project, which brings together artists from Greece and the U.K. The show opens at Tristan Bates Theatre in central London, playing for a limited run (18th-23rd February 2019).

This is a solo multimedia portrayal of a modern-day Phaedra, the legendary wife of King Theseus, who falls hopelessly in love with her young son-in-law, Hippolytus. In this version, she bears all the ambiguities of a restless, contemporary woman, who oscillates between the desires of the flesh and the attraction to the void, as she suffocates

in her socially imposed roles within the ruins of a decaying metropolis. The production's use of 3-D mapping, video projections and minimalist aesthetics yields a highly poetic visual trip through Phaedra's stations of personal and public history. The performer embodies all the characters of the ancient myth passed onto us by Euripides, Seneca and Racine. Taking on their speech, Phaedra is also in constant dialogue with her digital selves, becoming Aphrodite, Theseus, Hippolytus, the Chorus and the crisis-ridden City itself. Struggling to escape the existential fatigue that plagues her, she ultimately emerges as a palimpsest of voices, images and memories.

A haunting, multi-sensory rendering of the insatiable desire for motion and for love.

Miranda Manasiadis (Concept Dramaturg)

Miranda has been living and working between Athens, New York and Wellington, New Zealand/ Aotearoa for over a decade. After graduating in Theatre Studies, Classical Studies, and English Literature from Victoria University of Wellington in 2000, she has worked consistently in Theatre and Dance-Theatre. Initially working as a performer (dance, and later acting), the last 10 years has seen her focus her energies on direction, dramaturgy, and curation. Miranda's own performance company, There Should Have Been Roses, is known for staging contemporary performance installation works (NightRaids) in Wellington and New York. Miranda has been commissioned numerous times to create or curate works for various festivals and city councils. She has been awarded or nominated in all her chosen fields, namely Best Lead Actor for her role as Daisy in 'The Great Gatsby' -Dir: David O'Donell Wellington NZ, Best Writing for 'Flood'-Dir: Dr. Emma Willis, Wellington NZ, Best New Direction for 'The Singularity', Wellington NZ.Recently, her collaboration with Athens based Dance Company FingerSix and Sofia Mavragani, has seen their work programmed at The Athens Festival and at The Megaron Musikis. Miranda was invited to be on the board of directors for Circa Theatre, (Wellington's principal professional theatre). She was invited be an advisor and accessor for Creative New Zealand (New Zealand's main arts funding organisation), and invited to be an accessor for post graduate work with Victoria University's Script Writing programme.

Play Synopsis

Phaedra I—tells the story of Phaedra, the wife of the King of Athens, Theseus, and her profound existential boredom, which makes her crave a life of constant fulfillment. The play starts with the spell that goddess Aphrodite casts on Phaedra, which both liberates her and traps her into seeking sensual pleasure in her son-in-law, Hippolytus, and so treads on slippery, treacherous territory. The play proceeds with descriptions of Phaedra's devastating paralysis within the confines of her palace and of her own cynicism. We are made witness to sequences of charged interactions with the Chorus of Athenian women, who are castigating her about but also acting envious of her existence at the threshold of transgression, outside the rules dictated by her societal role. Victim to an insatiable thirst for life, Phaedra looks for release within the ruins of a timeless metropolis, of which she is the sovereign. She finally confesses to Theseus, which leads up to the inexorable ending of the play. The triangle is momentarily dispelled, but Phaedra emerges stronger and even more capable of the violence and the hurt to which Aphrodite has condemned her.

Anna Sbokou (Lighting Designer)

Anna studied at the Bartlett UCL (MSc Light & Lighting) and at Goldsmiths (Theatre Production). She has been a theatre lighting designer since 2008 and works independently on various theatre, dance and arts productions across the UK, New York, Low Angeles, Mexico, India and Athens. In 2009 she was awarded Young Lighter of the Year by the Society of Light and Lighting and in 2016 she was included in the 40underfourty list of up-and-coming lighting designers worldwide at the Lighting Design Awards 2016 in London. Her work also includes architectural and museum lighting and she is also on the Board of Directors of the International Association of Lighting Designers (IALD) since 2014.

Julia Kogou (Assistant Director)

Julia Kogou was born in Athens, Greece. She studied economics, e-commerce, pedagogical studies and drama in Greece and U.K. Senior of the postgraduate program of the Department of Theater Studies in Open University of Cyprus, she reasearches in the complicity of the audience during performances. She has worked as a business analyst, project manager, professor in high schools, performer. director, animator and sometimes as a writer. Since 2008. she has focused her theatrical activity on the devised theater and since 2011 on the physical theater. She directed, among others, the performances Tranquilla (Epi Kolono, 2010), Virginia (Epi Kolono, 2011) and the work-in-progress performance Project Macbeth (Booze Cooperativa, 2016). In 2015 she wrote and directed the play # Waiting # GoDo # Still a street performance which is still performed in Athens in different places.

Vanias Apergis (Music/Composer)

Born in Athens, Greece, Vanias Apergis started music lessons at the age of 8 and studied organ and jazz piano in his home city before going to Berklee College in Boston, USA, to study Film Scoring, and Newcastle, UK, to study Music Technology. Since 1998, Vanias has composed music for feature films, short films, video games, theater productions, TV series, games and shows. Vanias has also composed and produced music for other artists having credits on many records as a producer, composer, orchestrator, engineer and session musician. In 2004, Vanias began applying his film scoring techniques for TV and Radio commercials, and Idents, and has gradually incorporated Audio Branding theories and techniques. In 2016, he composed the music for Paul Mason's short film "Astoria", distributed by Facebook, which depicted parallels of the recent and WWII refugee crisis. Vanias has extensive experience in studio management and music publishing, co-owns the web radioclassical radio.gr and has also worked as a radio producer and host.

Michael Demetrious (Director of Photography)

Michael Demetrious is a filmmaker, currently located in Athens, Greece. He received his 'Bachelor of Arts' from the University of Greenwich in 2012 and is currently a post-graduate student of 'Theatrical Studies' at the Open University of Cyprus. Maria Hadjistylli (Assistant Director)

Maria Hadjistylli was born in Nicosia, Cyprus. She studied Biomedical Sciences and Clinical Microbiology in London, UK. Since 2013 she participated as an actress and assistant director in various amateur theatrical performances (*Alithino Pascha, Mias Pentaras Niata, Don Kamilo, To moro, O Anayiotos, The Ceremony*). She has also worked with the theatre company Act Studio in Cyprus as a stage assistant in the performances *Molis Horisa, The Little Mermaid* and the musical *Mazi*. She worked on the Tennessee Williams play *The Glass Menagerie* under the guidance of director Andreas Araouzos and Antidrontes theatrical team. She is currently a member of Peristerona theatrical team participating in the Pancyprian Festival of Amateur Theatre organised by the Cyprus Theatre Organization (THOC).
